Subject: NSGC Activity Update

Following are key highlights of National Society of Genetic Counselors (NSGC) strategic initiatives and other key activities through early September 2023. Research

- NSGC's top research priorities have been outlined in: <u>Advancing the genetic counseling profession through research:</u> *Identification of priorities by the National Society of Genetic Counselors research task force.*
- Our Research, Quality and Outcomes Committee has developed and is implementing an infrastructure to advance and support
 the research capability of genetic counselors and to support research on the practice of genetic counseling, especially
 outcomes research.

- NSGC's current research initiatives are outlined below:
 - Jane Engelberg Memorial Fellowship (JEMF)
 - The Jane Engelberg Memorial Fellowship (JEMF), established in 1991 as a highly prestigious award of the National Society of Genetic Counselors, is an ongoing tribute to Jane Engelberg in the form of a \$90,000 annual grant that funds scholarly investigation, promotes professional development and improves the practice of genetic counseling.
 - JEMF-funded research in progress:

 - "Genetic Counseling Service Delivery and Outcomes in Diverse and Underserved Populations," Sara Pirzadeh-Miller, MS, CGC, Principal Investigator
 - JEMF Student Awards
 - The JEMF Student Research Award is intended for students who are enrolled in an ACGCaccredited genetic counseling training program. These funds should be used to support research done while the applicants are enrolled in their training program.
 - Audrey Heimler Special Project Fund Award
 - The Audrey Heimler Special Projects Award (AHSPA) is an annual \$10,000 grant that funds a project or research focusing on the future of the genetic counseling profession and/or the provision of genetic services.
 - NSGC Special Interest Group Research Grant Awards
 - The SIG Grant Awards are supported and funded by NSGC to seed research by members of NSGC's Special Interest Groups in specific areas of specialization.
 - \$20,000 total available annually; \$250-\$2,500 per grant
- NSGC publications during last reporting period:



- "Genetic Counseling for the Dystrophinopathies—Practice Resource of the National Society of Genetic Counselors" was approved by the NSGC Board of Directors and will be published in the *Journal of Genetic Counseling*
- NSGC collaborative statements during last reporting period:
 - The NSGC Board of Directors approved an Affirmation of Value for the publication "Evidence-based consensus guidelines for ALS genetic testing and counseling"

NSGC Membership

Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion

- Justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion (J.E.D.I.) is one of NSGC four pillars in our 2022-2024 strategic plan.

- We continue dialogue with ASHG and other organizations as we develop our action plan to ensure our organizational efforts align with and contribute to increasing diversity and inclusion in the broader genetics and genomics workforce, and support extending the reach of genetics and genomics into underserved patient populations.
- We would welcome a dialogue with NHGRI to align and collaborate with other genetics workforce diversity initiatives as our efforts move forward.

Education

- The 2023 NSGC Annual Conference was held October 17-21, 2023, in Chicago, Illinois. Sessions were also offered virtually In order to increase accessibility for all interested attendees.
- The 2024 Annual Conference will be held September 17-21 in New Orleans, Louisiana.
